Microsoft Word Keyboard Roundup

Microsoft Word is probably the most widely installed program that is not an operating system. Of Word's many features, keyboard shortcuts are among the most useful. We have rounded up 20 handy keyboard shortcuts for Word and those that also work for all Microsoft programs.

General shortcuts for all Microsoft programs

Ctrl + P: Prints the document, spreadsheet, or presentation. If you have more than one window open, the item currently viewed will be printed.

Ctrl + W: Closes the window you have open.

Ctrl + O: Brings up the "Open" document window.

F12: Opens the "Save As" window.

Ctrl + S: Saves the document.

Ctrl + C: Copies what is selected.

Ctrl + X: Cuts what is selected.

Ctrl + V: Pastes what has been copied or cut.

Ctrl + A: Selects everything.

Specific shortcuts for nearly any version of Word

Ctrl + F: Allows you to search the document for a word or sentence.

Ctrl + Up arrow: Moves up one paragraph from where the cursor (black, blinking line) is.

Ctrl + Down arrow: Moves down one paragraph from where the cursor is.

Ctrl + Page Up: Switches to the top of the previous page.

Ctrl + Page Down: Switches to the top of the next page.

Ctrl + Shift + E: Enables "Track Changes," which will show any changes made to the document. (Pressing it again will turn off "Track Changes.")

Ctrl + Shift + C: Copies the format of the selected text.

Ctrl + Shift + V: Pastes the previously copied format.

Ctrl + B/I/U: Applies bold, italic, or underlined formatting to selected text. If no text is selected, the respective formatting will be enabled.

Tab: Moves to the next selection. If you have a list with numbers or bullets, pressing Tab will indent the number or bullet in once, and change it to a subheading under the previous point. E.g. "2." Will be indented and changed to "a." as a subheading under "1."

Shift + Tab: Moves back or moves one indent back (to the right). For lists, this will move the point up the hierarchy, e.g. "a." will be moved back to "2."

TECH TIPS



Summer heat waves come and go, but being proactive on preventing your server and IT network from overheating is a year-long necessity. Here are a few simple things you can do to prevent your valuable investment from crashing:

- Tidy up the server room; a neater room will increase air flow.
- 2. If you have more than one server, arrange them in a row so that the cold air comes from the front and is expelled out the back.
- 3. Keep the doors to the server room closed and seal off the space.

- 4. Make sure cold air reaches all the equipment.
- 5. Have a redundant A/C that is specifically designed for computers.
- 6. Buy a rack enclosure where the cooling is built into the bottom of the rack.
- 7. Keep the temperature at no more than 77° F.
- 8. Use blanking panels over any empty spaces on your server rack.
- Consider virtualization or hosting your servers in a cloud environment, so you are generating a lower amount of heat.
